### Stewardship Spark / Monthly Mission Moment

Did you know that in addition to your congregational mission dollars, the District budget is supported by other income sources including an estate from the Soenksen Legacy Fund? This account has provided support for Synod Missions, World Missionaries, Ministerial Health/Chaplain Staff, Lutheran School Outreach, Technology, Family Life Staff, and Professional Church Worker Loan Repayment. Since 2013, the account has supported these mission and ministries totaling \$870,000. This fall the budget also includes at least an additional \$50,000 for student debt reduction (known as the Ministry Excellence Fund). 

### **Congregational Treasurer's Manuals**

### The 40th Regular Convention of Iowa District West

Planning your budget for 2018? Remember to budget for the District Convention scheduled for June 24-26, 2018 at Camp Okoboji. The good news is there will be NO rate increase for the convention assessment: calculate \$60 per congregation and 18¢ per communicant member.

In IDW we are blessed to have Camp Okoboji host the District Convention which allows us to keep assessment rates extremely low compared to other districts.

Nomination forms for President, Vice Presidents, and other Board elections are now available for download on the District's website, along with the Lay Delegate form.

### **Concordia Plan Services Annual Compensation Report**

All congregations should have received in October the Annual Compensation Reports for Participating Workers and Certification of Non-Participation of Ineligible Workers. Both reports need to be signed and returned to CPS by December 31, 2017. If budgets and salaries are not approved by this date, return a copy to CPS with a note indicating when your budget will be approved. The information obtained is important; it ensures that workers receive the proper retirement, disability, and death benefits.

### Successful Secretarial/Administrative Assistants Conference

Nearly 70 administrative assistants enjoyed a wonderful day at the Secretarial/Administrative Assistants Conference in September. Thank you to those who attended and helped make it a success.

Nebraska speaker Kimberly Myers led the conference on the practical topic of church communications. Deb Burma inspired the audience with her "treasured" presentation. Comments included: "One of the best I've been to – love it;" "Worth the time out of the office!" and "I love the blend of information and inspiration."

The tentative date for next year is September 18, 2018 in Des Moines/Urbandale. Mark your calendar!

### **Housing Allowance**

The governing body of your congregation (church council or board of directors) should designate the amount requested by your ministers of the Gospel to be housing allowance for next year despite the recent District Court ruling highlighted below. This needs to be done prior to December 31, 2017 and must be documented in the written minutes of the meeting. This includes not only pastors but anyone on the Synod's roster or listed in *The Lutheran Annual* and are in the exercise of the ministry.

Churches should also designate a parsonage allowance for any minister who lives in a parsonage and who is expected to pay some of the expenses of maintaining the parsonage (i.e. utilities, furnishings, repairs, improvements, and yard care).

### District Court Calls Minister's Housing Allowance Unconstitutional

In October 2017, a federal judge in Madison, Wisconsin has ruled the minister's housing allowance is unconstitutional because the law discriminates against secular employees. This decision does not come as a surprise as the same judge issued a similar ruling back in 2013 before the case was dismissed by a higher appeals court on the technical grounds of standing. Judge Barbara Crabb writes in her latest ruling, "I adhere to my earlier conclusion that the minister's housing exclusion violates the establishment clause because it does not have a secular purpose or effect and because a reasonable observer would view the statute as an endorsement of religion." Unfortunately, we continue to live in a culture that is hostile to religious life.

What is the immediate impact for ministers and churches? Nothing for now. The court has issued its ruling simply declaring the housing allowance is unconstitutional but without any damages or other remedies awarded, so there is no immediate effect on ministers who are eligible for the housing exclusion under current law. Ultimately, the case will be tied up in the court system for years as the district court's decision will most likely be appealed, and a higher court will rule on the case. 

## Thanks, Iowa District West

There are so many needs in our world. How can we help? We cannot help everyone, but everyone can do something! It has been a whirlwind since the hurricane season started. After the hurricanes did their dirty work, we in Iowa District West reached out to Lutheran South Academy in Houston and to Zion Lutheran Church in Fort Myers, Florida. For

updates, go to <u>www.idwlcms.org</u> under District News. It has been and continues to be a privilege for me to work with God's people in Iowa District West who at this time have donated over \$66,500 for relief to Texas and Florida.

Gregg Pinick, CEO of Lutheran Education Association of Houston (LEAH) expressed his thanks to Iowa District West.



My first connection with Ellie Menz came on August 31, 2017. Ellie is the Director of IOWAY (Individual Outreach With Adults and Youth) for Iowa District West of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. She had heard that one of the LEAH School campuses, Lutheran South Academy (LSA), had been significantly flooded from the effects of Hurricane Harvey. She was calling to see if there was anything she could help us with as we recovered from the devastation. I'll never forget her telling me, "We have a semi-truck ready to come to you in Houston. What do you need?" I asked our response team, and we all agreed, "As much sheetrock as you can send us."

Harvey had just left the area. We had a major mess requiring that whole panels of sheetrock be removed from every wall of every one of our four buildings, and we weren't sure we could get any since everyone in the region was going to require sheetrock to rebuild. She responded, "No problem. I'll get right on it."

About a week later, she called saying she and her team could get another semi-truck and asked what else we needed. I told her we needed all the sheetrock supplies: mud, tape, etc. She stated that it was a big truck and they could bring anything for our workers who had lost much in the flood waters. We thought that was a terrific idea, and she went on to talk about how she could help the young children in our school as well. It was overwhelming. Then just like the first time, Ellie stated, "I'll get right on it!"



Less than three weeks later, our first shipment arrived at the LSA campus. It was a semi-load of 702 pieces of sheetrock. The driver, Troy, was so honored to be a part of this plan of reconstruction.

Two weeks later, Troy returned with another semi-truck full of sheetrock supplies, 10 totes full of dolls and monkeys for our younger children, supplies requested by some of our teachers who experienced the worst losses, new appliances for the school's uninsured rental house, and 13 large containers full of startup supplies for each of our worker families who had lost many of their possessions. The container held things like a crock pot, coffee pot, pots and pans, kitchen supplies, can opener, etc., that were so needed in the rebuilding process for our workers.



When I had first heard that water was rushing in our buildings due to the heavy rains and a swollen creek near the LSA campus on August 27, I asked God to guide and direct our community in the process of what to do next. His response has been beyond anything I could have imagined. A true Ephesians 3:20-21 experience. "Now to **him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think**, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen." Our God is faithful and nothing is too hard for Him. He used the people of Iowa District West to bless many people in Houston. He used people throughout the world to offer their love and prayers and support in helping LSA rebuild. By God's grace and mercy, the LSA students and faculty were back in their nearly completed buildings on Monday, October 16.

Thank you to the men and women of Iowa District West, and especially our newest friend, Ellie Menz! May God continue to use you to shine His love on those who are hurting in His world.



### HISPANIC OUTREACH IN SIOUXLAND – November 2017

### Oh, give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever. Ps.118:29

We must admit that at times we have prayed this prayer without thinking about the words. We have many reasons for which to give thanks to God. He has generously provided for our needs in body and soul. Above all we have the assurance and promise that He really is good and has eternal mercy for all.

That truth is not fully known or believed by many in Latin America. Many view God as an angry God who seeks only to punish our sins and errors. I remember the saying, "when it thundered, Father God was angry." We would have to say that God does have a right to be angry with our world and with us individually. He would be just in sending His wrath upon us and punishing us. But He has done and does something different for us and for all.

He is good and has eternal mercy for us. He sent His Son to suffer His wrath and punishment so that we would be forgiven and have peace with God. That is a good God and for that we can give thanks eternally.

Martin Luther first thought of God as only an angry, punishing God. He wrote: "My situation was that, although an impeccable monk, I stood before God as a sinner troubled in conscience, and I had no confidence that my merit would assuage him. Therefore I did not love a just and angry God, but rather hated and murmured against him. ... Then I grasped that the justice of God is that righteousness by which through grace and sheer mercy God justifies us through faith. Thereupon I felt myself to be reborn and to have gone through open doors into paradise.... If you have a true faith that Christ is your Saviour, then at once you have a gracious God, for faith leads you in and opens up God's heart and will, that you should see pure grace and overflowing love. This it is to behold God in faith that you should look upon his fatherly, friendly heart, in which there is no anger nor ungraciousness. He who sees God as angry does not see him rightly but looks only on a curtain, as if a dark cloud had been drawn across his face. (quoted from Roland Bainton's book on Martin Luther: Here I Stand, page 65)

How best can we share that truth with those around us? How can we show God's love and mercy to those who live not knowing His goodness and mercy? These are questions that we are asking in our area of Siouxland. Members from several area congregations have met to help reach out to the immigrants and especially to those who speak Spanish. We hope to have more helpers in this outreach and to involve the congregations even more in this ministry.

Please pray that God grant us the wisdom, encouragement, and resources to guide others to give thanks to our good and merciful God.

Our English classes continue at Hope and St. Paul's. Every week we have a few new students and the opportunity to know them and help them to know the Savior Jesus Christ.

When Abraham Lincoln made his thanksgiving proclamation in 1863, he also declared it a time of repentance. We as a nation and as individuals should recognize our errors and seek God's forgiveness while giving thanks. The following is a hymn of confession for us and our nation.

Great King of nations, hear our prayer. While at thy feet we fall And humbly with united cry To Thee for mercy call. The guilt is ours, but grace is Thine; Oh, turn us not away, But hear us from Thy lofty throne and help us when we pray.

Our fathers' sins were manifold, And ours no less we own; Yet wondrously from age to age Thy goodness hath been shown. When dangers, like a stormy sea, Beset our country round, To Thee we looked, to Thee we cried, And help in thee was found.

With one consent we meekly bow Beneath thy chastening hand And, pouring forth confession meet, Mourn with our mourning land. With pitying eye behold our need As thus we lift our prayer, Correct us with thy judgments, Lord, Then let Thy mercy spare. Amen.

L: In the mercy of Almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us. For His sake God forgives us all of our sins. May the Lord who has begun this good work in us bring it to completion in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. **C: Amen.** 

*Oh, give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever. Ps.* 118:29

Many have used this verse as a part of their table prayers before or after eating. One would have to confess that not always have we thought carefully about the words, as we hurry through the prayer. Today we take a moment to reflect on these words and give thanks to our wondrous Lord.

In this prayer we give thanks to the Lord. The name "Lord" means the one in authority, the one who has all power in heaven and on earth. He is the one who sends the sun and rain and gives us seedtime and harvest. He is the one who gives us life. He is the one who cares for us both in body and soul.

Also, this word "Lord" is the special name for the God who graciously makes a covenant with sinful people. It is the name "Yahweh" which means "the one who is." He is the absolute and unchangeable, the true God and Lord who chooses and calls a people to be His own. He is unique and separate from all the other false gods that humans have invented.

This Lord "Yahweh" is good. All that He does is for our good. He loved the world and sent His Son to be the Savior. In love He sent the Holy Spirit to lead us to faith and to guide us in His Word. In His goodness, He makes all things turn out for good to those who love Him. We may be tempted to think that our Lord is not always good, but in all times, good and bad, He is there to make all things work out for our benefit.

He has had mercy on us. We do not deserve His favor nor help. He has had compassion on us sinners who have disobeyed Him in many ways. He has sought to rescue us from condemnation by sacrificing His Son Jesus on the cross to pay for our sins and make us His forgiven children. We were helpless and unable to remove our sins. This good Lord has done this for us. We are united to His goodness in His Son Jesus. This good and merciful Lord does not change. His goodness and mercy will last forever. Unlike us, He is constant in His love. He does not arise one day in a bad mood and say that He does not love us anymore. He will not change His mind and take away His forgiveness from us. He will not change and do evil to us. His mercy for us, His love, His aid, His compassion, His help, His salvation, His forgiveness will last forever, to all eternity.

This Lord has made it possible for us to be with Him eternally. By faith in His Son Jesus Christ we will be with Him in heaven. We will see fully our Lord's eternal majesty, love, mercy, and power. We will be in His eternal goodness free from all the effects of sin. We will be free from evil, sickness, pain, sorrow, temptations, and death. In Him we can eternally say: "Oh, give thanks unto the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever." Amen.

**The Lord's Prayer:** Our Father, who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

# **Operation** Barnabas

## A network of care

**Operation Barnabas of Des Moines** will soon be launching our 5th year partnering with Freedom Alliance for their "Presents for Patriots" program adopting disabled Veterans and their families for Christmas. It is such an amazing and heartwarming experience to bless these families in such big ways. In early November we will share details on the families this year and how you can help.

Each of the four families received some sweets and goodies, a handmade quilt for every child (11 in total), a queen sized patriotic quilt for each soldier, a personalized laser-etched glass trivet with the family's last name on it, \$300 worth of gift cards, and a check for \$455. In December 2016, I drove to Fort Riley, Kansas where I met three of the families and the next day I met the fourth family outside of Kansas City on my trip back to Des Moines.

Following is a summary of the 2016 "Presents for Patriots" recipients.



The first family I met with was Army Sgt. 1st Class Heath A., his girlfriend Melissa, and their three children. He was active duty for five years with two deployments and has since been in the Reserves training soldiers in small arms operation and marksmanship. He has suffered repeated shoulder injuries, neck and hip problems, hearing loss, and PTSD. He's had a rough time transitioning back into family life, adjusting to family routines, physical limitations his body isn't used to, and increased memory loss. The quilts and glass work were very appreciated by the family. Heath and Melissa's jaws dropped and their eyes got real big when I told them about the gift cards and check. Melissa teared up and Heath said, "There aren't enough words to thank you." He continued that "this was so much more than I was expecting" and that they'll now have a "great Christmas." After the Christmas Party, Alicia from Freedom Alliance shared with me that Heath's family came up to her with tears of joy following our meetina.

The second family I met with was Army Staff Sgt. Juan R., his wife Val, and their three young children. He was in the Army for almost 11 years with three combat tours to Afghanistan. He initially sustained a back injury from a paratrooper accident and later suffered additional injuries when the vehicle he was in rolled off a cliff. His back and knee injuries have limited him greatly while his PTSD, social anxiety, and Adjustment Disorder have made his transition difficult. The biggest problem is knowing that his mind hasn't been the same since. He described himself as someone who loved physical activity, but he is having a challenging time accepting the physical limitations now on his body. Juan admitted he has put his family through a lot and has missed too many important family events and milestones. Since this is his last Christmas as a soldier, he wanted it



to be memorable and begin making a difference to his family. Everyone was very happy about the quilts and the kids were excited about the candy. Juan showed some tears while his wife had a huge smile on her face when I shared the gift cards and check. They fumbled for words, but they were filled with gratitude. They were tremendously appreciative and wanted to thank everyone who helped.

Family #3 was Army Sgt. Demetrius S., his wife Shannon, and their three children. Prior to Demetrius's second deployment, he was having health issues which included heavy fatigue,



feeling "out of my body," and "strange smells" that overpowered his senses. It was later discovered he had a cancerous tumor on his brain. He had one brain surgery, then days later become unresponsive and underwent an emergency surgery to remove part of his cranial bone due to brain swelling. Two months later he had a third surgery to replace the cranial bone that thankfully hadn't deteriorated during that timeframe. Months later he began having a series of seizures that shocked the family since they thought the worst was behind them. The quilts were a big hit with the family. Demetrius said he enjoys bundling up under several blankets and joked with his older son "don't you be taking MY quilt." Shannon was clearly moved by the generosity and gave me a couple big hugs, and Demetrius had a huge smile on his face after I shared the news. Shannon said our group was a "wonderful blessing" and Demetrius said we were "a big help."

The next day I met the fourth family at their home outside Kansas City. Army Staff Sgt. Michael Z. and his wife Christal are particularly friendly and an interesting couple. Their two daughters were at school when we met. He joined the Army in 1993 and served almost 22 years through several deployments. He had a fascinating career and is very fortunate to still be alive after a number of close calls long before his career ending injuries. During his last tour of Afghanistan, his vehicle came under attack and the vehicle rolled down the side of a mountain. He suffered a traumatic brain injury, broken ribs, multiple damaged areas of the spine, and tendon injuries to his dominant

arm. Initially he had significant problems with speech impediments, memory loss, and vision problems as a result of the TBI but has made substantial improvements through a range of therapies. They enjoyed the custom glasswork. The quilts were much appreciated including one having a princess on it that matched the large wall display of one daughter's bedroom. Both were initially in disbelief by the amounts, but then were tremendously appreciative. He thanked me repeatedly and said they'll have a "really great Christmas" and that this was "much greater than I hoped" while she noted they were "very blessed" and wanted me to thank those who helped.
