Bruce Wurdeman



Bruce Wurdeman serves as director of the United States Ministries division at Lutheran Hour Ministries, a position he has held since February 2008. In his current position, Wurdeman oversees the production of The Lutheran Hour® and Woman to Woman® radio programs, seasonal television specials, and print materials. His division also manages ministry fulfillment and referral services. He has been a leader in the creation of the Men's Network ministry.

Wurdeman previously worked at Lutheran Hour Ministries from 1994 through 2002 in the Volunteer Opportunities department as an assistant director and manager, positions that allowed him to recruit and train more than 100,000 volunteers throughout North America.

He most recently served as a mission and ministry facilitator for the Texas District of The Lutheran Church-Missouri

Synod (LCMS), where he was a resource person for 100 congregations in West and South Texas. Prior to his first stint at Lutheran Hour Ministries, Wurdeman filled a variety of roles throughout Lutheran circles, including principal and director of adult education at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Eureka, Missouri; director of campus ministry for the North Dakota District of the LCMS; director of youth ministry at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Fargo, North Dakota; and a math/science teacher and youth director at Zion Lutheran Church in Bethalto, Illinois.

Wurdeman has a bachelor's degree in Education and School Administration from Concordia University in River Forest, Illinois, and a master's degree in Exegetical Theology (Old Testament) from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He is a member of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Lubbock, Texas. He and his wife, Marijane, have three children and one grandchild.

Wurdeman will be the International Rep and speaker at the 2009 Iowa District West LLL Convention to be held June 13, 2009 at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Sioux City, Iowa.

Greensboro offers something for everyone in the family. Travel options make this an easy convention to attend. Fly into Greensboro, Raleigh-Durham (an hour away), or Charlotte (two hours away) or take Amtrak into Greensboro (the station is about seven miles from the convention hotel).

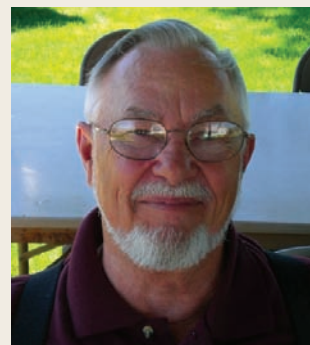
LHM is a Mission Worth Supporting!

Mission Statement

In loving response to Christ, the Servant, the Orphan Grain Train movement encourages and enables God's people to share personal and material resources in bringing Christ's name and character to needy people both far and near. Sometimes that character expresses itself as a word well spoken, sometimes as a bandage well applied, and sometimes as a child well fed.

Accomplishments During 2008

By God's grace and blessing, the many hands of Orphan Grain Train's volunteers from 18 regional divisions and Norfolk, Neb., continued to lift up the downhearted and downtrodden with humanitarian aid and disaster relief supplies in 2008. The numbers tell the story: 147 total semi-loads, including 63 sent overseas and 84 sent in response to domestic disasters. In addition, 52 smaller 14-ft. or 16-ft. trailer-loads and van-loads were dispatched in response to floods and tornadoes here in America. "We thank the thousands of volunteers and contributors who supported Orphan Grain Train in 2008 with donations of time, talent, and treasure," said Richard Jostes, Director of Development. "They make this ministry possible as a faith response in the name of Jesus Christ, bringing relief for human need worldwide."

Disaster Response

Hurricane Katrina, Gustav, and Ike relief efforts continued during 2008 with nine semi-loads of aid delivered to relief camps and distribution centers on the Gulf Coast. More than 135 pieces of Orphan Grain Train-provided equipment are in use throughout the Gulf Coast area, from 14-foot-long tow trailers to semi-trailer sized bedroom units, storage units, and water tankers. The 45-ft. kitchen trailer, delivered to Camp Restore in New Orleans in September 2006, is still in daily use there. This equipment has been committed for an additional year as the clean up and rebuilding efforts continue. "The Lutheran volunteer camps in Louisiana and Mississippi continue to welcome clean up and construction volunteers year-round," said Jostes. After three years, over 2,000 homes have been restored. More than 2,000 are still on the list. More than 50,000 vacant properties remain in New Orleans since Hurricane Katrina struck in August 2005. Meanwhile, 16-ft. and 18-ft. trailer-loads carried a merciful outpouring to flood survivors in Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, and Ohio. Orphan Grain Train's Indiana and Ohio Regional Divisions sent four semi-loads and 45 small trailer-loads of relief supplies

to flood recovery areas of Ohio for distribution by Lutheran Social Services (LSS) of Ohio. LSS-Ohio has been in non-stop flood response since 2007. The Indiana Division also responded to a flood in its region by adding a distribution warehouse in Columbus, Indiana, which served more than 300 families before Christmas.

Other Domestic Relief Efforts

Other shipments in America included 45 semi-loads to Texas border missions such as Ysleta Mission and Cornerstone Children's Ranch. Another 13 semi-loads were sent to the aid of Native Americans through special ministries in South Dakota and New Mexico.

International Shipments

Thirty-five of the 63 foreign shipments in 2008 went to republics of the former Soviet Union. The total number of sponsored orphanages in Estonia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Latvia, Lithuania, and Russia rose to 53 last year. These orphanages are part of Orphan Grain Train's "Adopt an Orphanage" sponsorship program whereby donors give monthly gifts restricted to their Orphan Grain Train-sponsored orphanage. After 17 years of ministry, the most requested items continue to be food, clothing, quilts, medical equipment, and Bibles. Details about Orphan Grain Train projects and outreach efforts can be found in Orphan Grain Train's quarterly newsletter.

Iowa West 2008/09 Activity Report

Jan. 17 - 1180 boxes of winter clothing and bedding shipped to Latvia.

March - Clothing and blankets sent to a family of five in Avoca, Iowa who lost their home in a fire.

April 3 - Container of 1,171 boxes of clothing, bedding and shoes sent to Latvia.

April - Container ready for Nigeria with medical supplies, clothing, bedding, two ATV's, utility wagon, water heaters, show-ers, tools. Supplies are for Gembu Center for HIV/AIDS advocacy.

December - A 40-ft.-long container was shipped to Kyrgyzstan filled with used clothing. Also, container number 834 arrived at Gembu, Nigeria, for the Orphans and Vulnerable Children program. It contained medical supplies for the clinic, plus clothing, tools and equipment.

On March 3, 2009, another shipping container was sent to Latvia filled with used clothing, shoes, wheelchairs and crutches.

On April 21, 2009 a container loaded and shipped to Uzbekistan with used clothing, bedding and medical equipment.
